

Advice Sheet – School Nurse Training and Sponsorship

Thank you for your interest in School Nursing.

In order to become a school nurse you must be a qualified and registered nurse who has undertaken further (post registration) training in Community Specialist Practice (Public Health Nursing/School Nursing) at degree level. This is normally a minimum of one year in length full time or the part time equivalent. All courses are at degree level, some offering postgraduate certificates or diplomas with a later option of progression to a master's dissertation. Prospective students will need diploma level qualifications or above. Some programmes have specific subject entry requirements such as research methods, health promotion or human physiology. Evidence of recent and continuing study is always useful.

The route of application is via a secondment onto a programme by an employer. Sponsorships/secondments are usually decided between January and March and may be advertised in the community section of the nursing press or on the NHS jobs website (www.jobs.nhs.uk). It would be wise to contact either your local University or local Primary Care Trust and ask for details from an appropriate manager or HR department at the earliest opportunity. Funding in Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland is slightly different with support coming through the Welsh Assembly, the local health board or the local health board trusts respectively. Funding from OHN programmes is likely to come from an employer.

Competition for sponsorship can be great, especially due to cutbacks in Trusts training new staff, with an expectation by most Trusts that you have at least one year's consolidated experience following nurse training, and in some instances more. Experience gained in a community setting will be useful, but is not always an essential requirement. However, there are currently an increasing number of opportunities for staff nurse posts in the community working with school nursing teams. It helps to have an aptitude for working with adolescents.

It may be useful to consider membership of the Unite/CPHVA, as with membership you have access to a number of benefits including a subscription to the 'Community Practitioner' journal which provides monthly information relevant to school nursing, and is the only professional organisation and union with a full-time school nurse professional officer.
