Human trafficking is a horrific crime against millions of people especially women and children. It hurts, humiliates and is physically and mentally damaging. Using human beings as commodities and depriving them of their dignity should not be tolerated.

90 per cent of trafficking victims are women and children. Trafficking relies on poverty and lack of work opportunities and thrives on deception and violence. At least 2.5 million people are trafficked for the purpose of forced labour and sexual exploitation around the world, including in the UK. It generates billions of pounds in profits for criminals and is the third largest growing criminal activity in the world, after arms and the drugs trade.

### Support for women who have been trafficked

- Ensure expertise of Human Trafficking Units eg in Metropolitan Police not lost, and trafficking not sidelined by other serious crimes
- Continued funding and support for the Poppy Project and others to provide housing, medical care, legal advice and counselling
- Further action to support strong implementation of the European Convention on Action against Trafficking in Human Beings, the Government's Anti-trafficking and End Violence against Women and Girls Strategies.
- Support Amnesty International's End Violence against Women campaign and Anti-Slavery International's Anti-trafficking Monitoring Group

### Support action to prevent trafficking

- Keep the overseas domestic workers visa in the UK, including the right to change employer and recognition as workers and extend to cover to migrant domestic workers who accompany diplomats; campaign for an ILO convention on "Decent work for Domestic Workers"
- Keep the Gangmasters Licensing Authority to protect agricultural workers and extend to other workers in eg hospitality, construction and agencies offering personal care to elderly and disabled people.

### International action including through trade unions

Unite campaigns strongly on these issues and is part of the international trade union movement.

For women .. who have been trafficked ... this vision lies far beyond the truth of their daily lives. As social inequality rises across and within countries that engage in the global economy, so does the need to redress these wrongs."***
